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




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
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Preface to M4M Image Book

In this series, you will learn 100 vocabulary using our image-learning method. We show a new method in memorization that is not rote. The drawback to rote *memorization* is that it generally ends up with the learner forgetting (very shortly after making efforts to memorize any given material)—often completely, what he or she thinks was not put to <u>permanent</u> memory. However, our method is not at all like this. Our Memory for Many (M4M) method focuses upon logical thinking and reasoning while connecting the critical dots to things (information) that are distinctly and succinctly tied to life experiences and lifestyle that are unique to YOU.

Using the **M4M** method, you will grasp how to use words with which you're already familiar in order to

learn *unknown* words. You'll do so through our unique slide format. Our slides show an image on the left and three connected text boxes on the right, which are separated into the following categories:

- the unknown word you would like to learn
- the known word which is also the linking word
- the creator's idea sentence

Since our M4M method *requires you to have one <u>known</u> word*, you should also check the second box—the one that contains the known *linking* word (first... at ALL times, just to make sure you know that word). Then, you are to go back to the first box and then take a look at the word. In the first box it contains the *unknown* word and it's part of speech, and then the definition.

Lastly, <u>you don't always have to look at the</u> <u>creator's idea sentence</u>. (It's simply there for your convenience in case you DON'T understand what is going on in the image.)

A labeled banner can sometimes be found on the top of the slide, advising the user of the difficulty involved in method being used for that *particular* slide. (The numbers beside it indicate the level of difficulty in that area.) The *unknown* word and *linking* word both have a resemblance that can be found in the image.

We utilize the following relationships in our method :

- reversed word method (sinnet and tennis)
- inverted letter relationships : b v.s. p, u v.s. n, f v.s. t, m v.s. w, and d v.s. q.

Moreover, we at M4M also use the "l" and "r" relationship, which is just similar in pronunciation; mostly to non-native speakers do these two letters sound similar.

How does the linking word link with the unknown word? Let's use "hand" to learn "haud" as an example. From the image <u>on page 20</u>, I first looked at the hand, and I noticed that the shape of the hand is like a glove. Using the relationship between "n" and "u," I can easily remember the spelling of haud. As for the definition of haud, which is to hold, I look at how the glove (hand) clumsily holds the chopsticks. This process is a logical thinking training rather than memory. If it is difficult to practice in this way, we will provide training courses to help you master it.

After you have done this process, move on the next word and do not think of the previous word at all. Lastly, after you have done this for all the words, you want to take a break. (There is no limit to your break, it could be a few hours, to a day, a week, or even a month! The catch is during your break, do not think of the words at all, try to forget them as much as you can.)

After your break, move on to the recalling process. The recalling process is where you try to think of the words you learned using the initial, basic M4M method. However, you want to start from the very beginning, it doesn't have to be in chronological order, but do not start recalling from the very last few words you have learned. (Doing so usually results in inaccurate results.)

To do the recalling process is quite simple really. You just want to cover up everything except for the image. From the image, try to see if you can identify the *linking* word... and then the *unknown* word. Try to identify what action is happening in the image to help you find the definition of the unknown word you are trying to recall. Then just apply the M4M recalling process to the rest of the words until you're done.
